Assistant Secretary of Commerce for Economic Development Alejandra Y. Castillo / U.S. Economic Development Administration

Alejandra Y. Castillo was sworn in as U.S. Assistant Secretary of Commerce for Economic Development on August 13, 2021, becoming the first women of color to hold this position. In this unprecedented moment of growth and opportunity, she leads the only federal agency focused exclusively on economic development.

She guides the implementation of over \$5 billion dollars in funding, powering the U.S Economic Development Administration (EDA) and its mission to make the transformational investments in America. During the implementation of the American Rescue Plan alone, she oversaw the investment of \$3 Billion dollars across nearly 800 projects, resulting in more than 200,000 jobs secured across the nation.

As the daughter of immigrants and small business owners, her journey is the embodiment of the American Dream. Her own experiences have helped affirm her commitment to EDA's number one funding priority: equity.

Spanning over three decades and three Presidential administrations --Biden, Obama and Clinton—her career has focused on creating equitable and inclusive opportunities for all Americans. Her career has also included shattering glass ceilings and providing inspiration to multiple generations of diverse leaders.

In 2014, Castillo was appointed by President Obama to serve as the National Director of the U.S. Department of Commerce's Minority Business Development Agency (MBDA), the first Hispanic woman to lead the agency. Under her leadership, she expanded its effort to help Minority Business Enterprises (MBEs) gain access to capital, contracts, and business opportunities, assisting MBEs to scale.

Her commitment to ensuring opportunity for every American is reflected in her current service as Federal Co-Chair for the National Advisory Council for Innovation and Entrepreneurship and as Co-Vice Chair of the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office's Council for Inclusive Innovation.

Castillo first joined the U.S. Department of Commerce in 2008 as a Special Advisor to the Under Secretary for the International Trade Administration. Additionally, Castillo served as a Senior Policy Analyst in the White House during the Clinton Administration. Prior to EDA, Castillo was the Chief Executive Officer of YWCA USA, where she championed the 163-year-old organization delivering critical social, educational, and economic development services throughout its 204 associations.





Natalie Madeira Cofield, President & CEO / Association for Enterprise Opportunity (AEO)

Natalie Madeira Cofield is an award-winning entrepreneur, philanthropist, economic development executive, and nationally regarded expert for small business and has been named one of the most powerful women in business by Entrepreneur Magazine.

Cofield is a former presidentially appointed Assistant Administrator for the U.S. Small Business Administration where she advised on the deployment of \$1.2 trillion in funding, and was the co-architect of the SBA's Community Navigator Pilot Program, which provided \$200M in funding to ecosystems and entrepreneurs throughout the country during the greatest economic crisis in modern history. As the head of the Office of Women's Business Ownership at SBA she was responsible for managing a grant-making budget of \$70 million and funding the largest expansion of the Women's Business Center network in the history of SBA at 146 Centers in expanding the network to every state in the US.

From Google to the National League of Cities, Natalie's speeches, courses, and advisory services have helped to shape programs and efforts of some of the most regarded global brands, and educational and government institutions. She is co-founder of the \$14M Coalition to Back Black Business which was responsible for funding nearly 1,000 Black-owned businesses during the COVID-19 pandemic.

A sought-after expert, Natalie's work has been featured on and by Inc, Time, CNN, NYTimes, Fast Company, Forbes, Entrepreneur, Business Insider, Black Enterprise, Essence, and EBONY, among others.

Once inspired by reading the business plans of her mother when she was 11, Natalie is the founder and former CEO of Walker's Legacy, a digital platform to empower women through entrepreneurship, and its adjoined nonprofit arm, the Walker's Legacy Foundation, which was established to empower income limited women through financial literacy and economic security. In this role, Cofield established a \$25,000 funded scholarship for enterprising women at her alma mater, Howard University.

In 2019, Cofield was named the inaugural Entrepreneur-in-Residence for the District of Columbia leading Mayor Muriel Bowser's 202Creates Program providing entrepreneurship advice to creative economy businesses within the District of Columbia.

An honors tech graduate from Howard University (where she was mentored by CIOs of two of America's leading Fortune 500 companies) Natalie leveraged her coding experience to build a career centered on empowering businesses, entrepreneurs, women, and underrepresented communities.

In 2023, Cofield received an honorary doctorate of humane letters from the Board of Trustees of Shaw University and served as the 2023 commencement speaker for the institution. She serves on the corporate board of directors for Harbor Bankshares Corporation.

An avid traveler, Cofield has visited more than 47 countries and counting.







Todd Greene, VP and Executive Director, WorkRise / Urban Institute

Todd Greene is a Vice President at the Urban Institute where is also the executive director of WorkRise, a research-to-action network focused on jobs, workers, and mobility.

Prior to joining Urban, Greene was executive director of the Atlanta University Center Consortium Inc. (AUCC), the world's oldest and largest consortium of historically black colleges and universities. There he led a team that enhanced academic programs, forged interdisciplinary research, and catalyzed a broad economic development agenda. Under Greene's leadership, AUCC engaged in thought leadership, collaboration, and strategic innovation for member institutions individually and as a collective.

For more than a decade, Greene served as a vice president in the research division of the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta. He led the economic and community development department and initiatives to promote inclusive economic growth, including community and economic development finance, small business access to credit, affordable housing strategies, and human capital and workforce development. Greene founded and led the Federal Reserve System's Human Capital/Workforce Development Working Group and oversaw creation of the Federal Reserve Center for Workforce and Economic Opportunity.

Greene has published numerous articles and is the co-editor of two books- Transforming U.S. Workforce Development Policies for the 21st Century (2015) and Investing in America's Workforce: Improving Outcomes for Workers and Employers (2018). He is past chairman of the board of directors of the International Economic Development Council and of the Georgia Economic Developers Association, current chair of the National Advisory Board for the Heldrich Center for Workforce Development, and serves on the boards of Corporation for a Skilled Workforce.

Greene is a certified economic developer (CEcD). He earned his undergraduate degree from Harvard University, master's degrees from Washington University and Georgia State University, and has completed executive education programs at Stanford University Graduate School of Business and Universidad ESAN (Lima, Peru).






Carolina Martinez, CEO / California Association for Micro Enterprise Opportunity (CAMEO)

Carolina Martinez is the CEO of CAMEO - the California Association for Micro Enterprise Opportunity-, a statewide association that represents 400 lenders, training programs, chambers of commerce, job creators, agencies and individuals dedicated to furthering Microbusiness development in the state. CAMEO advocates for its members and builds their capacity to support the almost 200,000 very small businesses they serve.

Carolina has 20 years of experience working in economic development and business consulting. Her vision has been defined by the variety of experiences she's had with nonprofits and universities in South and North America. She has developed bilingual, culturally appropriate entrepreneurial training programs; trained and coached pre-venture and startups; developed international networks promoting partnerships among private corporations that boost industries; provided consulting services to vulnerable communities to explore entrepreneurship as a way to generate wealth; and owned her own business consulting firm.

Carolina has served on the Pennsylvania Governor's Advisory Commission on Latino Affairs as well as on the boards of the Berks County Latino Chamber of Commerce and the Kutztown University Foundation. She serves on the Boards of two CDFI microlenders: Mission Economic Development Agency (MEDA) and Pacific Community ventures in San Francisco. Carolina serves on the Community Advisory Boards of Comerica Bank, Umpqua Bank and Cathay Bank and is a board member of the Association for Enterprise Opportunity (AEO). She serves on the California Governor's Entrepreneurship and Economic Mobility and is a Member of the Executive Committee and Chair of the Policy Committee of the California Coalition for Community Investment (CCCI) a statewide coalition of CDFIs. She has an MBA and BA in Industrial Engineering.





Inez Long, President & CEO / BBIF

Long has 28 years of combined experience in the financial services industry. She began her professional career in commercial banking in Credit Management and Commercial Lending with First Union and SunTrust banks in Orlando, Florida. It was while working for them that she met Judy Jones, the former President of the Black Business Investment Fund (BBIF).

Under Long's leadership, BBIF Florida has provided over \$47.6 million in loans to over 406 Black and minority businesses, created and sustained over 12,906 jobs all while maintaining a historical loan loss rate of approximately 4 percent; invested and leveraged \$55.2 million in community economic develop projects. She has led the organization to: (1) expand its geographic service area to statewide, (2) expand its client base from Black businesses to include other minority and underserved small businesses, (3) receive two federal New Markets Tax Credits allocation of \$20 million each, two FA awards totaling \$1.9 million, and (4) be selected as one of three initial CDFI's to be nationally recognized and received a Wells Fargo Bank Diverse Community Capital grant of \$1 million.





Wendy Baumann, President & Chief Visionary Officer / The Wisconsin Women's Business Initiative Corporation (WWBIC)

Wendy Katherine Baumann serves as President/CVO of The Wisconsin Women's Business Initiative Corporation (WWBIC), a statewide economic development corporation. Baumann accepted this challenging position in the community in 1994, providing the leadership required to ensure the achievement of WWBIC's mission and to uphold the philosophy of serving businesses owned by women, minorities and low wealth individuals in Wisconsin.

Former Director of Small Business Development at The Milwaukee Enterprise Center (MEC), Wendy previously served as Executive Director of The Hispanic Chamber Of Commerce of Wisconsin in 1987 and 1988. During that time, the Chamber was honored as "Hispanic Chamber of the Year" by the U.S. Hispanic Chamber of Commerce. Under her direction, the membership organization was recognized on a state and national level, increasing membership by over 500%. Baumann has also worked at The Council for the Spanish Speaking as Director of Development and Research and prior to that, as a Program Coordinator for a job placement program for disadvantaged individuals at Goodwill Industries.

Wendy has served on numerous national and local Boards including The Association of Enterprise Opportunity, Office Depot – National Women's Advisory Committee, The Association of Women's Business Centers, The National SBA Advisory Board, Johnson Bank, WHEDA, and Northern Trust – New Markets Tax Credit Boards, Federal Home Loan Bank of Chicago, The Institute of World Affairs, The Milwaukee Public Market Board, UW-Milwaukee Alumni Board, Herzing University Board, Milwaukee Metropolitan Civic Alliance, Milwaukee North Shore Rotary Club and others.

She was honored by UW– Milwaukee as The Graduate of the Last Decade in 1998, Professional Dimension's - Sacajawea Award in 2014, BizTimes Media's Woman Executive of the year in 2017, and Association for Enterprise Opportunity Impact Award for Innovation on Main Street in 2022. Wendy has two adult daughters and sons, five grandchildren, a fabulous border collie and Australian sheperd, and resides in a log cabin in Mequon, Wisconsin.







Alison Evans, Entrepreneurship Ecosystem Development Specialist / U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA)

Alison Evans is an Entrepreneurship Ecosystem Development Specialist with SBA's Office of Investment and Innovation where she manages the Regional Innovation Cluster program. Alison was formerly a Presidential Management Fellow with the SBA and through her fellowship she worked in the Office of Investment and Innovation, Office of Women's Business Ownership, and Office of Credit Risk Management. She also did a detail to the Department of Treasury's Office of Recovery Programs (now Office of Capital Access) where she worked with the Interagency Community Investment Committee.

Prior to joining public service, Alison worked with Lewis-Burke Associates LLC, a government relations and consulting firm focused on higher education and science policy. Alison has spent her career in policy and is focused on community and economic development to support communities and enable people to build generational wealth and a high quality of life.

Alison has a Masters in City and Regional Planning from the Georgia Institute of Technology and a Bachelor's of Science in Biochemistry from Arizona State University.

Daniel Flores is the Vice President, Regional Government Relations of the Greater Washington Board of Trade. In this capacity, he serves as the chief lobbyist for the organization representing the interests of Board of Trade members in DC, Maryland, Virginia and US Congress on various issues including: transportation, affordable housing, technology and innovation, workforce and education and more. Mr. Flores has served in many leadership positions including President & CEO of the Greater Washington Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, Senior Director of Outreach for the US Chamber of Commerce, Community Affairs manager for Washington Gas and appointed during DC Mayor Anthony Williams' administration as chief of staff of the DC Public Service Commission.

Daniel has served on boards, commissions, non-profits and under three Maryland governors. On April 6, 2023, Lewis became CEO of the Baltimore, Maryland-based Minority Depository Institution and Community Development Financial Institution and leads various banking and investment activities conducted through its subsidiaries and affiliates.

Lewis held various roles in the Global Wealth and Investment Management Division of Merrill Lynch. He began his tenure there as Chief Financial Officer for Bank Product Distribution in the Global Banking Group. He was previously a banker at Credit Suisse First Boston.

Lewis serves as Trustee and Investment Committee Chairman of the Maryland Teachers and State Employees Supplemental Retirement Plans and The Severn School. He formerly served as Vice Chairman of Baltimore City Community College, a designated Minority Serving Institution. Lewis is a member of the Young President's Organization and Real Estate Executive Council.

For the past five years, Brienne has served as the Director & President of Startup Sioux Falls, where she has led the organization through significant transformation, aligning its mission, vision, and physical presence to better serve the startup community. Under her leadership, Startup Sioux Falls has become a cornerstone for founders and startups, providing essential resources for networking, launching, and scaling ventures.

One of Brienne's most notable professional achievements occurred in 2021, when Startup Sioux Falls was selected as one of only 51 organizations nationwide to receive up to \$1M as part of the SBA Community Navigator grant pilot program. Through her strategic stewardship of these funds, Brienne has spearheaded initiatives to support underserved communities across the state, including Indigenous South Dakotans, women, veterans, New Americans, and immigrants. Her and her team's efforts have resulted in nearly 4,000 counseling hours and the training of over 400 clients in two years.

In addition to her role at Startup Sioux Falls, Brienne has held leadership positions in prominent non-profit organizations such as the Sioux Falls Jazz & Blues Society and Downtown Sioux Falls, Inc. (DTSF). Committed to making a difference beyond the boardroom, Brienne actively participates in grassroots initiatives, including an annual hygiene product donation drive for area homeless shelters. She is also a dedicated member of the Downtown Rotary Club and serves on a city of Sioux Falls advisory board, contributing her expertise to shape the Downtown 2035 Plan and development of the downtown area.

Jo Panzera, President, Executive Director / Start Small Think Big

Jo Panzera is the Executive Director of Start Small Think Big, a non profit organization that works to advance economic equity for small business owners who face systemic barriers.

Originally joining Start Small Think Big as the Chief Financial Officer before moving into the Executive Director role three years later, Jo brings a unique blend of non-profit leadership, entrepreneurship experience, and finance expertise to the role.

Jo began her career at PricewaterhouseCoopers in London, rising to Director, Corporate Finance, leading mergers and acquisitions in the consumer goods, retail and leisure sectors. She also worked for and sat on the board of a social enterprise investment fund in the UK, Big Issue Invest. In 2010, Jo relocated from the UK to California and left PwC to run a small, event management business, working closely with non-profit clients to create fundraising events and producing festivals, sports and custom events across the USA and Europe.
